COCKATOO ISLAND

Inscribed on the UNSECO World-Heritage List, Cockatoo Island is Sydney's largest island, and as a result of its pivotal role in Australia's convict and defence history, it retains an incredible legacy of over 80 colonial and industrial assets including buildings, cranes, docks and slipways. The F8 Cockatoo Island Ferry runs from Circular Quay. Regular ferry services also run from Darling Harbour, Barangaroo, or any of the wharves along the F3 Parramatta River route.

Cockatoo Island has overnight accommodation with a waterfront campground and heritage houses and apartments.

Hazards such as voids and uneven surfaces exist on Cockatoo Island, a former industrial site. Exhibition spaces, except Building 101, on Cockatoo Island are accessible by wheelchair.
