Cockatoo Island is Sydney's largest island and forms part of the UNESCO World Heritage List, along with 10 other historic sites that together form the Australian Convict Sites World Heritage Property. As a result of its pivotal role in Australia's convict and defence history, it retains an incredible legacy of over 80 colonial and industrial assets including buildings, cranes, docks and slipways.

Cockatoo Island has overnight accommodation with a waterfront campground and heritage houses and apartments.

Hazards such as voids and uneven surfaces exist on Cockatoo Island, a former industrial site. Some spaces are darkened and require extra vigilance. Contact our team to talk about how we can welcome you to the island and ensure your visit is safe and enjoyable.
